THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

FIRST LESSON

Reader: A Reading from the Book of Joshua

Then Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem, and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the Lord, the God of Israel: Long ago your ancestors Terah and his sons Abraham and Nahor lived beyond the Euphrates and served other gods. Then I took your father Abraham from beyond the River and led him through all the land of Canaan and made his offspring many. Now therefore revere the Lord, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the Lord to serve other gods; for it is the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; and the Lord drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the Lord, for he is our God." But Joshua said to the people, "You cannot serve the Lord, for he is a holy God. He is a jealous God; he will not forgive your transgressions or your sins. If you forsake the Lord and serve foreign gods, then he will turn and do you harm, and consume you, after having done you good." And the people said to Joshua, "No, we will serve the Lord!" Then Joshua said to the people, "You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen the Lord, to serve him." And they said, "We are witnesses." He said, "Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your hearts to the Lord, the God of Israel." The people said to Joshua, "The Lord our God we will serve, and him we will obey." So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and made statutes and ordinances for them at Shechem.

SECOND LESSON

Reader: A Reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. 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Joshua 24:1-3a, 14-25

The book of Joshua narrates one account of how the Israelites came, after forty years of struggle with God and with one another in the wilderness, to enter the land of Canaan. For many Christians today, Joshua is the most problematic book of the Bible. This stems from two of its features. First, it narrates a series of violent attacks and battles (ch 6-12). Secondly, we now know that the Joshua model of "righteous" people entering another people's land and destroying them and their culture was, in fact, very much the model in the mind of the settlers who came to North America and many parts of the colonized world between 1500 and 1950, and deliberately destroyed the peoples and cultures they found there. To these two, we can add a third problem, which is that twentieth century archaeology in Palestine has made clear that the account we find in Joshua of great cities being destroyed simply will not hold up in the light of the layers of remains and their dating. In fact, the account of a more gradual settlement found in Judges seems to match the archaeological data better. The collectors and editors of the traditions found in Joshua gave them a frame through which to view them. Near the beginning, and at the very end of the book, we hear of ritual actions the people take to renew their faithfulness to God. At the opening of the book we find the accounts of the stones of witness at Gilgal, circumcision and Passover (ch 4-5). In today's reading we hear how the people came together at Shechem to renew the covenant. All ancient Near Eastern covenants

(treaties) begin with a recital of the history of relationships between the two parties, and this one is a summary of the entire story from Genesis 12 onwards (24:2-13). Our narrative does not include the covenant laws or conditions, but it is likely that at such an event they may have been read aloud for everyone to hear. It does include statements of commitment (vv 14-18), and warnings of consequences of failing to meet the conditions of the treaty (vv 19-22). And as the book began with the setting up of stones of witness, it also ends with a stone of witness (vv 26-27). [Dr. Walter Deller/2023]

What is Christian Stewardship?

As Christians we are invited to give back to God out of gratitude for all that God has first given us. Christian giving is:

- Proportional to one's income (1 Corinthians 16:2; 2 Corinthians 8:12)
- Consistent (1 Corinthians 16:2)
- Sacrificial (Mark 12:43-44; 2 Corinthians 8:2-3) 6
- Cheerful/Joyful (2 Corinthians 9:7)

The spirit of Joyful Giving asks that we put God's priorities before our own. It comes from our substance, not our excess. This act can lead us into a closer relationship with God because if we are giving an amount that is truly a sacrifice we are expressing the belief that our security lies not in our material wealth but in God.¹

Looking at Twenty-First Century Privilege and Racism: A Reflection

The fight against racism and other struggles for equality in the twenty-first century have shown us how much there is still to accomplish. We know that people are still subject to prejudiced, discriminatory, and racist acts and micro-aggressions today. Micro-aggressions refer to common verbal, behavioural, or environmental actions that stem from negative or derogatory attitudes toward marginalized groups. White privilege and denial of racism are two reasons why micro-aggressions in the workplace, at school, with a medical professional, in government settings, with the police, at a store or business, in a religious setting, at people's homes, or out in public still continue and must be addressed.

When people say, "I do not see race", they are revealing that they do not see that race is a daily issue in their lives. Being able to ignore and deny racism is a privilege that some people have. A privilege is a special advantage or opportunity that is available only to certain people. White people have the privilege of assuming that they will be treated as "normal" and they will not be treated as different, foreign, or a threat. Their white privilege shields them from daily interactions based on race. For them, it is easy to assume that something they do not see or experience does not exist. As a result, racism denial continues to be an issue in the twenty-first century.

There are a number of phrases that help us spot racism denial. Phrases such as, "I do not see race"; "race does not exist so racism does not exist"; "it's just a joke, so it doesn't mean anything"; "you're over-reacting"; "they were products of their time"; "I don't care what colour someone is, they can be green, or purple, or..."; "you need to focus on the

positive and not complain about everything,"; "you don't know that was racially motivated"; or "you need to see both sides"; show us that people are denying racism and racist acts.

There are many ways that people try to deny racism. One major way that people deny racism is by refuting or minimising the action. People try to refute racist acts by saying that we do not know for sure the motivation behind an act and demanding proof that an action is racist or racially motivated. People try to minimise a racist act by trying to look at it in isolation and not in a systemic way. They try to explain that an action is being exaggerated and that the victim is being overly-sensitive. Another way that people deny racism is by shifting the focus of the problem or distorting reality. These people try to shift the blame by pointing out other forms of oppression or social ills or by proposing alternative causes of the problem that do not include racism. Another way that people deny racism is to try to excuse racism. They explain that it is only humour and is not dangerous. They say that people should not be blamed because they were "products of their time". People who try to excuse racism sometimes even blame the victim for an event.

Masai Ujiri becarme General Manager of the Denver Nuggets in 2010 and then General Manager of the Toronto Raptors in 2013. This made him one of a very small group of N.B.A. General Managers who were of African descent. In 2019, he won the N.B.A. championship with the Toronto Raptors when they beat the Golden State Warriors in California. Sadly, on the most important day of his career, he was stopped from joining his team by a deputy sheriff who refused to let him pass and pushed him back despite what Ujiri was explaining. Ujari explained later, "The video sadly demonstrates how horribly I was treated by a law enforcement officer last year in the midst of my team, the Toronto Raptors, winning its first world championship." He also said, "... Yet, unfortunately, I was reminded in that moment that despite all of my hard work and success, there are some people, including those who are supposed to protect us, who will always and only see me as something that is unworthy of respectful engagement. And there's only one indisputable reason why that is the case — because I am Black." Following this event, there were many explanations by racism deniers who blamed Ujiri, who said that that the event was not that significant, who claimed that Ujiri and the Raptors were over-reacting, and who said that the deputy sheriff was not being racist when he was stopping people (even though he did not stop and push white people). There are many things that people can do to deal with racism denial. We can ask why a person is dismissing or disbelieving evidence. We can speak up and call out racist acts.

We can offer broader more comprehensive views of racism. We can cite facts that are left out. We can explain that the time period does not justify racism. We can celebrate progress, but explain that we do not need to be complacent. We can correct misinformation. We can shift the conversation back to its focus on racism by explaining how racism interacts with other forms of discrimination. We can ask why a person is dismissing evidence or minimising the effects of racism. We can explain that good intentions can still result in racist acts. We need to explain that empathy is not enough. Accountability must accompany empathy. We all have a role to play in the fight against racism and racism denial.
