THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

FIRST LESSON

Reader: A Reading from the Book of Judges

The Israelites again did what was evil in the sight of the Lord, after Ehud died. So the Lord sold them into the hand of King Jabin of Canaan, who reigned in Hazor; the commander of his army was Sisera, who lived in Haroshethhagoiim. Then the Israelites cried out to the Lord for help; for he had nine hundred chariots of iron, and had oppressed the Israelites cruelly twenty years. At that time Deborah, a prophetess, wife of Lappidoth, was judging Israel. She used to sit under the palm of Deborah between Ramah and Bethel in the hill country of Ephraim; and the Israelites came up to her for judgement. She sent and summoned Barak son of Abinoam from Kedesh in Naphtali, and said to him, "The Lord, the God of Israel, commands you, 'Go, take position at Mount Tabor, bringing ten thousand from the tribe of Naphtali and the tribe of Zebulun. SECOND LESSON

Reader: A Reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labour pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. Judges 4:1–7

In the Jewish scriptural collection, the books Joshua, Judges, Samuel and Kings are known as the Former Prophets. Many modern scholars refer to them as the Deuteronomistic history, because the complete history seems to have been drawn together from a variety of types of older oral and written sources sometime during the period of the deportations

and exile (587-400 BCE), and they reflect the particular theology, political ideology and world view of the book of Deuteronomy. Judges, the second of these book, is one of the most intriguing in the Bible, not least because of the vivid characters we encounter (Achsah, Ehud, Deborah, Gideon, Abimelech, Jepthah and his daughter, Samson.) It offers a different picture of how the land was settled, one that suggests a gradual process of different groups moving into the fertile northern hills and setting up little agricultural communities that shared economics resources, and provided mutual defence and protection in the period between about 1250 and 950 BCE. There is evidence that these early settlements were much more gender egalitarian than we see elsewhere in the Bible, But the book also suggests that in the long term this social model was not sustainable in the face of economic pressures and changing military technology, especially the discovery of how to make iron. This seems to have led to societal change and increasing intergroup violence including gender violence (see especially ch 17-21). Leadership during this period seems to have been charismatic, people with gifts and skills in the moment referred to as "judges", rather than institutionalized (kings and priests). In fact the book reflects strong rejections of hierarchical arrangements such as kingship (ch 9 especially). Our reading today tells us some of the story of Deborah, one of the earliest of these figures. This prose account comes from a much later period than the poem in Judges 5— Deborah's song. Most scholars consider the song to be one of the two or three earliest pieces of Hebrew poetry, from close to the events in question (around 1200 BCE), and perhaps by Deborah herself. This act can lead us into a closer relationship with God because if we are giving an amount that is truly a sacrifice we are expressing the belief that our security lies not in our material wealth but in God.¹
